Atlantis crew ready for 'complex mission'

The site across the river is a rare one.

Space Shuttle Atlantis and Endeavour are sitting on launch pads. At press time, Atlantis' launch has been postponed from Oct. 10 to 14 at 10:19 p.m.

The last time two shuttles sat on pads simultaneously was in 2001.

The STS-125 mission is to service the Hubble Space Telescope, and in the unlikely event of a rescue mission of its crew, Endeavour has been rolled out to Pad 39B. The crew will be too far away from the International Space Station in case of an emergency.

After Endeavour is cleared from its standby duty as a rescue vehicle, workers will move it to Pad A in preparation for liftoff on Mission STS-126 to the ISS. That mission has also been delayed four days to Nov. 16 at 7:07 p.m., according to NASA officials.

Atlantis' upcoming 11-day mission is the final shuttle flight to the Hubble Space Telescope. Five spacewalks are planned to install new instruments and thermal blankets, repair two existing instruments, refurbish subsys-

tems and replace gyroscopes and batteries. The result will be six working, complementary science instruments with capabilities beyond what is now available, and an extended operational lifespan through at least 2013.

The seven-member crew will enhance the observatory and ensure cutting-edge science. It puts in place advanced technology that improves the discovery power of Hubble by 10 to 70 times.

The crew is Scott Altman, commander; Gregory Johnson, pilot; and mission specialists Michael Good; Megan McArthur; John Grusfeld and Mike Massimino.

During a press conference Sept. 24, Grunsfeld described how difficult the mission will be. "The bottom line to me is this mission is really hard," he said. "After (STS) 109, I thought we'd really maxed out what we could do on a space mission. This time, we've added a lot of content with inspections. From an EVA standpoint, we've gone from doing heart surgery on Hubble to what is comparable to doing brain surgery on Hubble with the instrument repairs. So, this is going to be a very complex mission. ..."

Police warn residents property theft on rise

In a 24-hour period Titusville residents Andrew Whitaker and his wife Amber had not one, but two of their vehicles stolen from their Tanglewood subdivision driveway recently.

While tending to their infant son in the hospital, the couple came home to first find Andrew's truck gone.

"I couldn't believe it. The doors were locked," said Whitaker, who's running for Titusville City Council. When the brazen criminals stole the truck, they cleaned out everything in it including the keys to Whitaker's company car – a wrapped Brooke Insurance car. The keys were in the console.

"I was worried that they'd take the car the next day, so I wrote a note on it saying the car was being watched," he said. But, the note didn't faze the robbers. They came back the next night and drove off with Whitaker's business car.

Both vehicles were recovered a day after each was stolen. The truck was found in a ditch on Gibson Street complete with dings and bangs in the back from it being rammed by another vehicle. "The truck had about \$3,000 worth of damage on it," he said. "Apparently they got stuck and tried to get another vehicle to push it because there was a broken headlight on the ground."

The car fared better and was found in East Mims.

The Whitakers weren't singled out; they are part of a growing number of victims of property theft in the North Brevard area as the economy worsens, according to Titusville Police Department Lt. Todd Hutchinson.

"It's happening all around the city, not in just one place and it's a reflection of what's happening all over the state. Property crime is on the rise statewide," he said. "Criminals get into an area then move on." The police indicate that 75 percent of the criminals are locals, while the others are more professional and called "gypsy burglars" who go from community to community.

"It's mainly juveniles who are stealing the cars and items in them. We know this because we've caught some in the act and have chased others. Some parents are not keeping track of their kids."

Hutchinson offers tips to deter property thieves:

- Keep your vehicles locked at all times.
- ♦ No matter if you're home or not, always close

your garage door.

- ◆ Don't keep valuables in the vehicle, including keys to your home, vehicles or business.
- ◆ Have a car alarm, especially an after-market one that makes noise when someone gets close to it.
 - ◆ Get a steering wheel lock.
- ◆ Illuminate your driveway and garage/parked auto area with motion detector light.
- ◆ Pay attention to what goes on in your neighborhood and immediately report suspicious activity to the police and your neighbors.
- Establish a network in your community to share information.

Superintendent announces retirement

After spending four decades in public education, including the last nine years as superintendent of Brevard Public Schools, Dr. Richard DiPatri is retiring.

Brevard County School Board Chairman Janice Kershaw announced Sept. 24 that she and the School Board were notified by DiPatri of his intentions.

DiPatri's current contract expires June 30, 2009, and he has notified the board that he will not pursue the extension offered him by the Brevard County School Board, Kershaw said.

"When Dr. DiPatri was hired, his charge from the school board was to take our district to 'the next level' of achievement. He has delivered in full on that charge," Kershaw said. "His leadership has been integral to the success that we have enjoyed as a district these last nine years.

He is an outstanding educator whose tremendous expertise has earned him much-deserved respect among peers across Florida and indeed the nation.

She applauds DiPatri's "foresight in succession planning."

"He and his staff have put steps in place to ensure that any transition in senior leadership is handled smoothly. I believe that Dr. DiPatri's legacy with Brevard Public Schools will be one of continued success and student achievement."

Under the superintendent's leadership, Brevard Public Schools was awarded the coveted 2007 Governor's Sterling Award recognizing organizational performance excellence. Brevard is only the second school district in Florida to win this award in 15 years.

"As you might imagine, I have ambivalent feelings about this deci-

sion, but after 40 years of serving students in two states, I believe it is time to step aside," DiPatri wrote in an e-mail to employees after he notified School Board members of his decision.

"I have been blessed during my tenure in Brevard with an intelligent, caring and focused School Board which has motivated the district to improve significantly over that time," DiPatri added. "I have also been extremely fortunate to work with an incredible senior staff of executives and a leadership team of principals and managers without equal. The teaching staff of Brevard is responsible for our exemplary student performance which was made possible by a support staff of outstanding employees; custodial, cafeteria, bus drivers, teacher assistants and school office personnel."

Anglers fish for top prizes at 10th Annual Hunt for Red in October

The redfish are shaking in their skins as 1,000 anglers take to the Indian River in Titusville Oct. 4-5 for the 10th Annual Hunt for Reds in October.

Here's what this event isn't: It's not a Tom Clancy novel, although the founders did have to get an OK from the author for the name. It isn't an event in which you have to be a professional angler with a big fancy boat (although it's cool if you have one). It's not about the biggest fish like most fishing events.

It's about spots.

The angler who pulls up a redfish with the most spots wins – usually about 25 to 30 will do, says Phil Rizzo, the event's coordinator.

"It's a great event, two days of family fun where everyone has a good time and it's all for a good cause," he said

The popular contest is for the nonprofit organization Fishing For Others Inc. Proceeds from the event this year go to the Brevard chapter of Safe Kids, an organization that provides car seats, bike helmets and other safety items for families.

The winner of the catch and release event receives a 17-foot Hewes Tailfisher boat with a 60-horsepower

Yamaha engine and an AmeraTrail trailer to transport it.

The second-place winner gets \$2,000 cash, third place wins \$1,500, fourth gets \$750, fifth earns \$300. The first-place senior wins \$300 and a trophy.

The first-place lady also receives a trophy and \$300. The first-place junior wins a Cocoa kayak product. A second-place junior gets \$200 in prizes and third-place junior gets \$100 in prizes.

Each angler will receive an entry to take home the use of a Dodge Ram truck for one year or the cash value, a Gheenoe kayak and money in raffles.



Local race team wins big

After chewing up one track after another Josh Robinson, 25, from Titusville won the national title of Raptor 3300 World Karting Association National Championship in Beechnut, Tenn., Sept. 14.

As JB's Race Team pulled out of the parking lot from Daytona's last Florida Divisional Dirt Series state race of the year Sept. 7 with one state championship and three second-place titles, Robinson and teammates Ezra Beske, 12 from Titusivlle, and Mim's Jason Todd Burke 15, were ready to head to the last race of the season.

Burke took the FDDS State Championship in Jr Lite and third in state in Jr Heavy. He transferred those wins over to the nationals to give him a shot at the national

championship.

Robinson took second place in the state for Raptor 330 and transferred that standing over to the nationals.

Beske, after racing only two out of four national races, had put himself in contention with two second-place finishes in the FDDS in the Blue Lite and Blue Heavy categories.

The team packed up and left Sept. 10 for the long drive to the nationals in Tennessee, set up the next day and Sept. 12 brought practice time and final adjustments to the karts.

Sept. 13 was the start of their busy weekend with Burke sitting outside the pole and taking the lead right away for six laps. He fell back to sixth then worked his way back to second. With only two laps to go, he went for the lead, slipped up and finished fourth in the race. Burke's final standing for the 2008 WKA National rankings are second place in the Jr Lite division and fifth in the Jr Heavy division.

Robinson ran Stock Lite and finished third in the race, giving him third-place in the 2008 WKA National rankings in that series.

Beske ran a great race in the Jr II Lite and finished sixth place in the race and sixth in the 2008 WKA National rankings in Lite and Heavy.

Sept. 14 Robinson rolled up his sleeves and got to work in two races. He sat in the pole position in Stock Medium and led for 12 laps. He came up short with a third-place finish for the race and a secondplace finish in the 2008 WKA National rankings in that class. The last race was Robinson and the Raptor 330. After a hard-driving race, Robinson came in third place, ranking him first overall and gave him his first national title.

"I'm very proud of them," said Jim Burke, the team's manager. "The JB's Race Team had a great

year. As a team they had the most wins at Daytona, wins at every track they raced at in the Florida Divisional Dirt Series and also winning the Grand National Race in North Carolina. We have won local championships, state championships and now WKA National Championships."

It's never over in racing. The taste of victories has the team excited about next year and all it's changes. While the team will still race karts in dirt, they will add asphalt as well. The team will move up to four-cylinder mini-stock cars at Orlando Speedworld and will debut their 1968 Camaro on the drag racing scene at Orlando Speedworld in the near future.

The team will pursue oval racing in the most competitive arenas in the southeastern United States.



Using Extension Cords Safely

From the Ashland, OR, Fire & Rescue Squad comes these tips on using extension cords safely:

Use them only for short, temporary periods.

* Use a polarized cord for safety, one in which one of the prongs is wider than the other, preventing the plug from being inserted incorrectly.

* Make sure cords do not dangle from counters and table tops where appliances can be pulled down accidentally or the cords tripped over.

* Discard old, cracked, worn or damaged extension cords.

* When disconnecting a cord, pull the plug rather than the cord itself.

* Use only three-wire extension cords for appliances with three-prong plugs. The third prong is a safety feature designed to reduce the risk of shock.

* Stretch out the cord; if coiled or looped, it can generate

heat and pose a fire hazard.

* Don't cover the cord with newspapers, clothing, rugs, or any other object while it is being used.

* Don't load too many appliances onto a single extension cord; overloading the cord can cause a fire.

* Use special. heavy-duty extension cords for high-wattage appliances, such as air conditioners, portable electrical heaters and freezers.


When using tools and appliances outdoors, use extension cords labeled for such use.
