

Recruiting begins for superintendent's job

Wanted: one superintendent of Brevard Public Schools.

The ad is out to replace Dr. Richard DiPatri, the county's superintendent who leaves his position in June.

At the cost of \$45,000, Cedar Rapids headhunter company Ray and Associates, Inc. is searching for the replacement and includes the position on its web site. The corporation touts itself as being "a professional organization that specializes in school executive leadership searches."

DiPatri's base salary is \$204,941 plus bonuses. The position is listed as being in the range of \$240,000 plus a comprehensive benefits package. The final salary will be negotiated by the candidate and five-member school board, according to Judy Preston, BPS associate superintendent for financial services.

"His salary is not set by the state because it isn't an elected position," she said. "Brevard County is the 44th largest school system in the country and our district is the 14th of the 100th largest in the nation, so this job is like running a major corporation. It's like trying to find a CEO."

But in a time when officials are turning over couch cushions to find a dollar, taking \$45,000 away from the school coffers raises eyebrows.

"It's terrible. Surely there are other ways to advertise for that job, such as business and educational magazines," said C.L. Lozier, a Titusville resident, who is also aggravated at the amount of money the next superintendent is going to make. "In other sectors, they start out the pay at the bottom for new employees. Why start the salary above what he makes?"

Mims resident Richard McEarchern is so fed up with the educational budget cuts he can hardly talk about it.

"It's ridiculous paying \$45,000 to find another superintendent. It's also ridiculous to pay for such things as \$50,000 to replace a fence when they already had a good one (at Titusville High School)," he said, even though McEarchern understands the fence replacement was money earmarked from rebuilding funds. "You can always transfer that money somewhere else."

McEarchern is worried about the proposal to close Pinewood Elementary, his daughter's school. "I feel most sorry for the teachers. What happens to the ones who've taught at that school and in

Commissioners abolish impact fees

It just got easier to do business in Brevard County.

The county commissioners voted unanimously Feb. 26 to waive commercial impact fees for one to two years.

"We want to stimulate growth," said Commissioner Robin Fisher. "These are tough times. If we can stimulate the economy by stopping the impact fees it will help businesses that want to develop and create new jobs especially in construction."

Although the commissioners still need to hammer out the details of the moratorium, Fisher said he's pushing for it to cover two years.

"By the time we permit a project, the whole process for construction takes about two years anyway," he said.

Throughout the county many developers tell the commissioners that because of the impact fees they cannot do a project, said Fisher.

Fisher is optimistic that the North Brevard area will especially benefit from the moratorium on commercial impact fees because he said many times cities suit with the county. Those who have to pay impact fees in the city also pay for the county's fees.

Many business owners and those in the construction field have complained that Titusville's impact fees are too high, which has been a major deterrent in attracting new business.

"Hopefully the city will do the same. The key is to stimulate the economy."

others that may close? Do they just lose their jobs?"

Last week the school board approved to cut their salaries from \$38,290 to \$36,000, a first-year teacher's pay.

"Years ago, (the school board's) salary was under a beginning teacher's salary," Preston said. "That has been conversation by the board and the public at times."

Because the school board members are elected officials, their salaries fall under Florida statutes. However, in January the Florida legislature passed a bill allowing school board members to cut their salaries.

How much can they cut?

"Whatever they want," said Preston.

Obama: No shuttle extension

After political rhetoric and a lot of finger-crossing, hopes to extend the space shuttle past 2010 are gone.

According to an outline of the nation's budget Feb. 26, President Barack Obama intends for NASA to fly the space shuttle to complete the International Space Station and then retire the fleet in 2010. An additional flight could be conducted if it can safely and affordably be flown by the end of 2010. Funds freed from the shuttle's retirement will enable the agency to support development of systems to deliver people and cargo to the ISS and the moon.

NASA will receive more money than in the past – \$17.8 billion in 2009 and a project \$18.7 billion in 2010. Last year it received \$17.2 billion, \$16.3 billion in 2007 and \$16.7 billion in 2006. In addition, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 includes \$1.0 billion.

NASA will stimulate private sector development and

demonstration of vehicles that might support the agency's human crew and cargo space flight requirements.

According to the breakdown, NASA will continue developing the ISS including having permanent crews. It will also continue to do these tasks with other countries, commercial industries and academic institutions.

Calling it "a new chapter of this legacy," referring to a robust program of space exploration involving robots and humans, NASA will press on with the Bush Administration's vision to return to the moon by 2020. It also includes robotic missions to places throughout the solar system.

Funding highlights also include aeronautics research to address aviation safety, air traffic control, noise and emissions reduction and fuel efficiency. Money will also fund a program of space-based research that supports the administration's commitment to deploy a global climate change research and monitoring system.

Comments needed to preserve PEG channels

Comments are needed by March 9 from municipalities in a Federal Communications Commission proceeding to preserve public education and government ("PEG") channels.

The FCC has opened a case on preserving PEG channels as they have always been provided and thwarting attempts by AT&T, Comcast and others to make them hard to find (via several Internet web page menus), hard to view (poor quality) and hard on the wallet (some people will have to pay to get a converter box to view them). Success in this case is important to preserve PEG channels and prevent these attempts to thwart them from spreading.

The action for the residents of Titusville is to call or email the City of Titusville and request their support for this fight. According to the web site www.varnumlaw.com/serviceGroups/cableTV/cableFranchising, the cost per municipality is \$300. Go to the site, as it has detailed information on how municipalities can file comments. At the same time, express your opinion on the state of affairs concerning your experience of the current Titusville Government channel viewing, or not

viewing

The case combines a case filed by Dearborn Michigan/Meridian Twp about Comcast providing PEG channels only as digital channels in the 900 number range and a case filed last month by the City of Lansing, Michigan and one filed by the Alliance for Community Media challenging AT&T's provision of PEG channels as Internet-style videos.

The March 9 deadline for comments is important. It is paramount that the FCC get comments from many municipalities and others who use PEG channels. Otherwise, cable/AT&T will claim that the lack of such comments shows that keeping PEG channels viable is not important.

The most important thing municipalities can do now to preserve PEG channels as they have always been provided is to file comments with the FCC by March 9.

This is an important and possibly landmark case on preserving PEG channels. Please give it your careful attention.

Tipsters text cops

Text messaging is so popular the Titusville Police Department is capitalizing on it.

There's now a new way for citizens to anonymously submit a tip to the police about a crime, reporting gangs, drugs, violence, threats, abuse and vandalism. It's called Text-A-Tip.

Using a cell phone, people can simply text "TPD" plus their tip information to CRIMES (274637). The person will then receive a unique confirmation code to confirm the tip has been received.

Working with TIPSOFT Inc., TPD receives the tip, communicates with the tipster if necessary, assigns the tip to the proper division for follow-up and to record and track crimes solved as a result of the tip.

The tipster's anonymity is maintained by TIPSOFT who first receives the tip and then assigns a generic number that becomes the tipsters ID. Citizens can also submit a tip online by going to www.titusvillepd.com. The same anonymity applies to this type of submission as well.

Highlights of the program are:

☐ Text message is private and confidential

■ No caller ID

☐ Now one will ever know your ID, not even the police

☐ Text messagers can submit a tip and not fear retaliation.

☐ If you have additional information about your tip just continue to reply to the original message.

☐ Your message/thread can be terminated at any time by texting "stop."

There are no additional costs for this service, however standard text messaging rates with the person's carrier apply.

"Having the ability to tap into a resource such as this will be beneficial on several levels. Allowing citizens to send a tip, who many have otherwise not done so, will simply help make Titusville a safer place," said Chief Tony Bollinger.

"Text messaging is such a widely used form of communication, opening up a source such as this just makes sense."

Attorney General gives \$40,000 to Red Cross from price-gouging settlement

Attorney General Bill McCollum Feb. 25 presented the Capital Chapter of the American Red Cross with a check for \$40,000 from a price gouging settlement his office reached earlier this month. The check will go to the American Red Cross National Disaster Relief Fund.

"As Attorney General, I take my responsibility to enforce Florida's price gouging law very seriously, and I'm pleased to be able to present such a deserving organization with these settlement funds," said Attorney General McCollum. The Attorney General announced a settlement with Flash Foods, Inc. on February 10, resolving allegations of price gouging during Hurricane Ike. Flash Foods, Inc. is a convenience store and gasoline retail chain with 16 Northeast Florida locations. The company cooperated with the investigation.

Under the terms of the settlement, Flash Foods will reimburse consumers

who were overcharged for gasoline at a Florida Flash Foods store between Sept. 12 and Sept. 20, 2008. The company was also required to pay \$40,000 to the American Red Cross National Disaster Relief Fund.

"We are very grateful to Attorney General McCollum for supporting our critical mission," said David Chayer, Regional CEO for the American Red Cross. "The money we receive today will be used to provide disaster help to families, neighbors and communities when they need us the most." Chayer added that \$40,000 would allow the Red Cross to serve over 13,000 meals in a day; open and staff two shelters for up to two weeks; or provide 60 families with cash needed to buy immediate needs like clothes, food, and other basic needs following a disaster.

The Attorney General's Office still has

Can't trim school budget fat? Leaders should look in mirror

That's what's plaguing the nation's corporations down to the school districts like ours.

Teachers and others in the school system can't say anything for fear of losing their jobs, but there are some valid points that have to be said. And I'm going to say them.

When you make \$204,941 a year plus bonuses as a superintendent, don't tell teachers they might want to think about cutting their salaries. Brevard County teachers' average salary for a bachelor's

degree is \$42,966. A first-year teacher's pay in this county is \$36,000.

And isn't it special that Dr. Richard DiPatri, Brevard superintendent, refused to give himself a raise this year? How nice of him. Since teachers' wages are frozen, what else could he do?

If you're a new teacher in the county, you're biting your nails right now because DiPatri's proposal is to fire up the chainsaw in the new teacher area when pruning begins. These poor people worked hard and finally got teaching jobs.

Here's an age-old question. Why is it teachers make the least pay yet they are the ones on the battlefield molding our children? This isn't to say that administrators don't do anything, but the ones in my book who are the most important in our children's lives get paid so much less than the higher-ups.

There's fat to be cut.

I know! How about not spending \$45,000 for a headhunter to find a new superintendent? That could save more than one job. Paying that kind of money

right now when thousands are rallying against the worst cuts in history, is simply disgusting and flagrant. In the age of cyberspace and publications, it doesn't cost \$45,000 to advertise for a new superintendent, come on.

DiPatri said there's no more places to trim the fat but he forgot to look in the mirror and so did the school board.

Brevard County school board members make \$38,000 and some change. For most if not all, this is an additional salary to another job they have. Now they decided the other day to cut their own salary back to a starting teacher's pay of \$36,000. Why not cut it more?

The legislature has given Florida school board members the leeway to do it. For the school board members who feel such a calling to do the job, help our children and teachers and make a difference in education (that's what you all said when you wanted us to vote for you), cutting your salary some more would be helpful to say the least. I mean, if the teachers were asked to consider it, then why not you? I know the school

board works hard and we appreciate everything they do. If you shave, let's say, \$16,000 more off you'd save the schools \$80,000.Can you do the job for \$20,000 instead? I'd do it for that. I'd do it for a lot less if that's what it would take to make even a little dent in the budget cut.

Yes, these things won't solve all the problems, but it's a start.

Just like the automotive industry CEOs who arrived in their private jets on Capitol Hill only to do the Poor Pitiful Pearl act and turn out their "empty" pockets, you can't convince teachers, parents and the rest of the community that the Brevard Public Schools has no money when there are high salaries.

I don't want to hear that the superintendent's salary or that the school board's pay is the going rate of the state or the country. It isn't about comparing. It's about doing. Someone has to make the change.

If these are truly desperate times as DiPatri says, then act it. Set the example as leaders, please.

Budget backs \$28 billion in small business credit

WASHINGTON – President Barack Obama's FY 2010 Budget Overview offers full support for the U.S. Small Business Administration's credit programs, authorizing SBA to support loan guarantees of \$28 billion to small businesses.

The FY 2010 Budget Overview provides a broad outline of the president's budget priorities, including an appropriation for SBA of approximately \$700 million. The full budget proposal with account level appropriation details is scheduled for release in April.

The spending cited in the broad proposal would be in addition to the \$730 million funding provided for SBA credit programs in the recently enacted Recovery Act. That Act – for which most spending is targeted for use in 2009 and 2010 – authorizes SBA to raise guarantee percentages on some SBA loans to 90 percent, temporarily reduce fees on SBA-backed loans, expand funding for Microloans, and raise the maximum size of SBA-guaranteed surety bonds.

The bill outlines maximum authorization levels for SBA credit programs well above current demand for those programs. It sets a maximum of \$17.5 billion for SBA's 7(a) General Business Loan Guarantee program, \$7.5 billion for the 504 Certified Development Company Loan program, \$3 billion for the Small Business Investment Company debenture program and \$25 million for the Microloan program.

The bill also provides for \$1.1 billion in direct disaster loans and provides for the launch of a pilot program to test the use of SBA-guaranteed loans as part of the agency's response to disaster declarations.

Heritage Park on hold

The national economic crisis has forced the postponement of the planned construction of Brevard Heritage Park, a collaborative project between the North Brevard Heritage Foundation, Brevard Community College Titusville Campus, Brevard County and Parrish Medical Center.

The park is a multi-million dollar project planned for construction on 10 plus acres behind BCC and between the North Brevard Chain-of-Lakes and the planned site for the Health Village at Main Street PMC (on BCC land). However, Brevard Heritage Park was contingent upon obtaining the necessary funding.

"It is unfortunate and we are disappointed that at this time given the unprecedented economic realities we are all facing, funding for this multi-million dollar project is currently not available, which means needing to postpone the project for now," said District 1 Brevard Commissioner Robin Fisher.

"Having to postpone such a visionary project weighs heavily upon everyone involved," said Jim Drake, BCC president. "Hopefully we will be able to complete the project when the economy recovers its stability."

The delay will result in changes to the project master plan. For example, the planned site for the Health Village at Main Street PMC was selected because of its connectivity to Brevard Heritage Park. With the postponement, Parrish Medical Center, in collaboration with Jess Parrish Medical Foundation, BCC, Brevard County and the North Brevard Heritage Foundation, will modify plans for the Health Village at Main Street PMC.

"Revised plans are being drawn up that will ensure the Health Village at Main Street PMC remains a one-of-a-kind location for health care services for seniors," said George Mikitarian, PMC president and chief executive officer. "The plan may be changing, but the goal or the outcome. The Health Village at Main Street PMC will be a healing center for seniors like nothing else in America, and it will be located right here in North Brevard.

Titusville Follies gives back to community

Beverly Matthews isn't one to tap around problems, or spend the rest of her twilight years yearning for the good old days. She's one of around 50 local folks who have found joy in singing, performing, and in her case, tap dancing up a storm. Matthews, along with the others are gearing up for the Tenth Annual Titusville Follies.

The Titusville Follies will be presented in performances beginning at 7:30 p.m. March 19, 20 and 21, and has become a community involved production since its inception and first performance at LaCita County Club 10 years ago.

According to Jerry Lapidus from the playhouse, Follies' date back to the early 1920's and have come to mean "fancy variety shows," Lapidus said. Singing, dancing and comedy are all involved.

According to producer Penny Storm, every dime raised from the performances is donated to the playhouse, amounting to nearly \$15,000, if last year's figures are used.

Everyone who wants to be involved in some way is welcomed, and this year's production involves more than 50 individuals, in singing, dancing and handling the behind-the-scenes jobs.

"The Follies is unique because if you want to give back to the community and you want to be involved in the production we'll find something for you to do," Storm said. "You don't audition for a show, but you audition for what part you'll play in the show. Everyone who tries out is accepted and welcomed to participate."

In fact, many who audition did so because they were so enthused just watching the show. That and the fact that the show isn't about featuring professionals. More like involving people who love singing, dancing and those who have always wanted to be a part of a theatrical production but never had the chance. While Follies' typically involve seniors, the Titusville Follies welcomes those of all ages and this year's

production includes those from age three to those in their 70's.

This will be the eighth Follies' for Lynne Librizzi, who does a little of everything in the show.

"It's been interesting to see the Follies grow from about 20 people the first year to around 50 this year," Librizzi said. "Initially it was performed at LaCita Country Club, and only club members were in the show and attended the performance

"It's enjoyable to see people with different talents at different stages of life participate. Some have never done this type of thing before, and everyone who wants to be part of show is welcomed. Nearly a quarter to a third of the cast are snowbirds, many come back every year to participate."

The singers have been practicing for a couple hours once a week at the First Presbyterian Church in Titusville, while the dancers practice at the North Brevard Senior Cente. While only a handful of last minute rehearsals are held at the theater, it somehow always comes together Storm said.

For First Presbyterian Church Pastor Mary Sample, involvement in the Follies gives her a chance to take on new roles.

"I'm typically given singing parts that are out of the norm for a pastor, and it's nice to get to be just a normal person," Sample said. "And it's nice to be able to open the church up to the community for practice because we see this as an outreach to the community."

The Follies' music is live, and in this year's show there will be four production or full cast numbers and one solo prerecorded by the Follies' singers and musicians.

Tickets are \$15 for balcony and \$17 for orchestra seating and may be purchased at the playhouse any weekday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or by paying using a credit card by calling 268-1125, or by paying the door. For more information contact Storm at 393-2288.

Don't flip out over early hair

Dear Christian Allen.

I have very curl hair. It is flippy on one side and the other goes under just fine. No one seems to cut my hair so that it wont flip out on that side. Why can't someone get it right? Furtherer more where should I look for a hairdresser that would be able to cut curly hair?

Signed, Flipping frustrated

Dear Hair Flipper.

It sounds to me like you have a styling issue rather than a stylist issue. There are many good cuts for curly hair on the market today. Not everyone is for you but lets assume you get a good style cut into your hair. When styling your hair at home it doesn't look the same as when you leave the salon. Then there must be a dif-

ference in the way you style your new cut.

Your stylist should discuss the products they used and a complete explanation of how to manage your hair. I have seen this common problem of the one side flips all.

Do you change hands with the brush and the blow dryer when you change sides of your hair? For instance put the brush in the other hand when you switch to the other side of your hair.

This helps keep the same angle of the brush and heat on both sides while drying. If this doesn't work, thentake it as a sign and flip the other side out also. It is time for a change.

The advantages of great omega 3's

ccording to the American Heart Association (AHA), Omega-3 fatty acids benefit the heart of healthy people and those at high risk or have cardiovascular disease.

Two kinds of Omega 3 fatty acids, EPA (eicosapentaenioc acid) and DHA (docosahexaenoic acid) can be found in higher levels in fatty fish such as mackerel, lake trout, sardines, herring, albacore tuna and salmon,

The American Heart Association recommends eating fish at least twice a week; however some fish can contain high levels of environmental contaminants such as mercury.

Fish oil supplements can offer some of the same benefits as eating a lot of fish without the risk of contaminants. Look for supplements from a reputable source that have been molecularly distilled and purified.

While the exact dose to take is not clear. Evidence from studies suggests .5 to 1.8 grams per day (EPA+DHA) can "significantly reduce deaths from heart disease and all causes")

As always, consult with your physician before taking any supplements.
