Discovery delivers equipment to ISS

Space Shuttle Discovery lifted off at 11:59 p.m. Aug. 28 after two attempts days earlier.

STS-128 delivers supplies and equipment to the International Space Station. The Leonardo Multi-Purpose Logistics Module, a pressurized "moving van" will be temporarily installed to the station. It will carry 15,200 pounds of cargo. Using the station's robotic arm, it will be installed to the station and returned to the shuttle's cargo bay for its return to Earth.

The module delivers science and storage racks, a freezer to store research samples, a new sleeping compartment and the Combined Operational Load-Bearing External Resistance Treadmill or COLBERT treadmill.

The 13-day mission includes three spacewalks to replace experiments outside the European Space Agency's Columbus laboratory and install a new ammonia storage tank and return the used one.

Ammonia is used to move excess heat from inside the station to the radiators located outside. STS-128 also delivers a new crew member and bring back another after almost two months aboard the space station.

The crew is commanded by Marine Corps Col. Rick Sturckow, piloted by Air Force Col. Kevin Ford. Mission specialists are retired Army Col. Patrick Forrester, Jose Herandez, John "Danny" Olivas, Christer Fuglesand, Nicole Stott and Army Col. Tim Kopra.

STS-128 is the 30th trip to the station, 128th shuttle mission and Discovery's 37th launch. Six flights to the station remain before the shuttles' retirement in 2010.

Army Staff Sgt. Chad Tucker, a 2000 Astronaut High graduate, died Aug. 19 in a training exercise.

The Beacon reported on June 28, 2007, that the Titusville native, a Black Hawk helicopter crew chief in the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment from Fort Campbell, Ky., was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary heroism while participating in flight operations in Iraq.

Tucker, 28, was a member of the Delta Company, 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment's Night Stalkers. They were performing high altitude training on Mount Massive in Colorado when their Blackhawk helicopter crashed.

Others onboard were Warrant Officer Terry Geer, 40, of Casper, Wyo; Chief Warrant Officer Robert Johnson, 41, of Seattle and Staff Sgt. Paul Jackson, 33, of Lancaster, Md..

"I have flown with and deployed with all four soldiers over the past three years and without a doubt they were truly America's most elite aviators and patriots," said Chief Warrant Officer Alan Dean. "Unfortunately, you will never know the heroic deeds these individuals have accomplished as our missions are classified and out of the spotlight of the news.

"They will be sorely missed."

He said that Tucker was recently accepted to flight school; he was to attend in October.

He is survived by his wife, Megan, son Jeremy of Fort Campbell, Ky., and his parents Wendell "Dale" and Wanda Tucker; and his sister, Crystal Castaner of Titusville.

In the 2007 interview, his mother described their relationship as close. His father and grandfather also served in the Army and ever since he was a little boy, Chad always dreamed of being a soldier.

"He's a hometown here who has gone above and beyong for this country and paid the ultimate sacrifice," said Dean.



Organization crafts hundreds of baby quilts

They're an army of one. One hundred and forty quilters work silently in the community turning their hobby into aid for other organizations.

In the First Baptist Church, where the Space Coast Quilters gather, a sea of baby quilts hung over the pews Aug. 19. There, four area clergymen – a rabbi, Catholic and Episcopal priest and Baptist minister – blessed 315 quilts before being gathered; and 241 were given to area charities, hospitals, fire departments and other agencies. The 74 remaining quilts will be sold by the organization to pay for materials for next year's project.

"I think all of us feel we're doing something for someone," said Pat Reid, coordinator of the annual baby quilt project. Only 35 quilters made the items.

"We've been doing the baby quilts since 2002," she said. "This year our goal was 250, so we're happy with the results." Reid said the ladies meet each Wednesday morning at the church from April through June.

Members of the Space Coast Quilters also make comfort quilts for retirement homes and hospitals. "We give away five

or six quilts to organizations that ask us for them at Christmas," said Reid, who's been quilting since 1980.

The organizations crafted 240 bed quilts for Hurricane Katrina victims and 35 quilts to people in Kosovo. "We donate all year long," said the organization's president Ann Giles, who's been quilting for six years. "We give our work and our time and people sell raffle tickets and make money for their organization." Giles can't believe she's the president of an organization she used to see walk down the halls of Brevard Community College where she worked several years ago.

"I'd see them as they were going to teach quilting classes and I'd say to myself that one day I'd like to learn how to quilt – and here I am."

Their motto is, "We share because we care."

But they do more than quilt to help others. It may be too warm to think about the holidays yet, but the quilters are already figuring out who is helping with Christmas dinner – not dinner for them, but complete food baskets for those less fortunate.

When they're not working together, they enjoy each other's company so much, they go on trips – sometimes even out of state.

The organization is always looking for new members.



Dry your eyes because your kids are picking your nursing home



I have come down with an affliction.

It's called the empty nest syndrome. I think it happens more to women than men, since my husband is taking it a lot better than me.

My youngest son wasn't supposed to leave for college until next year but was awarded a scholarship to an arts academy (boarding high school) in Michigan this year – his senior year - as a trombone student. It's a great thing truly a gift from God - and we're very proud of him, as this will prepare him well for college music conservatories, which is his dream.

Did you ever feel happy and sad at the same time? From spending many hours with him a day – playing taxi driver to and from Titusville High, taking him to trombone lessons all over Central Florida – to having a lot of time on my hands. From laughing and big hugs that take my breath away because he's an overgrown puppy that doesn't know his own strength – to hoping I hear from him once a week.

I know there are other parents out there who in recent weeks have moved their children into dorms. I'm sure there's an emptiness – not only in the house but in the heart.

It isn't just about missing your son or daughter.

As parents, moms especially, we go full speed every day with our kids. We're nurturing 24/7. What was once bandaging and kissing scraped knees becomes the task of giving sound advice, encouraging words and drying tears from more complex situations.

We box up the items for the dorm. Did we pack everything? Did we prepare him properly to be a mature older teen – being honest, moral and hardworking? Did we give him all the sound advice he needs for school and relationships?

Like a cake we've carefully prepared and put in the oven, is it done yet? Will it be delicious or will it fall in in the middle? There aren't any do-overs in life.

My husband quips, "Thank God He made men different from women," although he understands my empty nest affliction.

As parents who are going through this, now we have to adjust our lives. Many of my friends say, "Wow, now you have time for *you*." And that part is good but also a sound illustration of how empty nest is real because our role now shifts. Of course, we're still parents but our tasks aren't on a 24/7 basis anymore. There's also no segue between the two. It just abruptly changes in one day. We don't even get the chance to break in the shoes.

And we cannot traumatize and embarrass our children by constantly calling them or making them feel bad that they left. It's about as hard for us as when they broke away from a pacifier or bottle. This time we're having to break away.

And all of this comes right when we're going through the middle age thing. Looking at our wrinkles, gravity taking over, taking medication and the list goes on. It just isn't fair is it? And on top of everything we have to put on a brave face.

When I drop him off in Michigan this week, I can't cry. I must act as happy as he is.

"Wow, so you have a two-hour drive back to the Grand Rapids airport?" he asked me. "Won't that be boring?"

"No," I say to myself. "I'll probably cry most of the way."

But instead I just tell him, "Oh it will be a pretty quick trip."

As my dad always used to say, "This too shall pass."

The sadness will wear off, roles will shift and soon just being proud of him will be the lasting emotion. Looking forward to seeing him on his school breaks will be the order of the day.

I will adjust. If I don't the warning he's given me for years will resound in my head.

"Remember, be nice to me because I'm picking your nursing home."

Convenience can be costly but happy customers will frequent the same "convenience store" over and over again. Not necessarily for the "convenience" but there are large numbers of individuals who go to a particular store because they enjoy seeing the same individuals on a daily basis and who generally purchase coffee and snacks along with lottery tickets. These individuals will typically congregate outside and are willing to stand in the heat, cold or inclement weather for this socialization. This was the trend discovered by longtime convenience store manager Steve Prather when he decided to open his own store.

"I wanted something decidedly different so I came up with the concept of a coffee bar and combined that with aspects of a convenience store, sports bar and Internet café, offering coffee and other beverages (excluding alcohol), snacks, other miscellaneous convenience store items and lottery to create a relaxed environment to come in and sit, enjoy a hot cup of coffee or other beverage, chat with friends and make new ones, check or send emails, or sit back and enjoy watching sporting events on one of two large flat screen televisions, said Prather. "I call this alternative environment a "comfort store."

He opened his store, called Lucky 'U' Spot at 3204 S. Hopkins Ave., Titusville, FL (behind St. Theresa's and between the Mail Center and Aliff Hair Designs) Aug. 15, ahead of schedule, due to the anticipation and demand by friends and former customers he has served in the past. At this time the only feature missing from the store is lottery sales, which are anticipated to start within two to four weeks.

One of the best features of Lucky U Spot is the great prices such as 50cent canned sodas, \$1 coffee of any size cup and 25-cent refills.

Sept. 5 the Lucky 'U' Spot holds a Grand Opening Barbecue in the parking lot with karaoke inside. No purchase is necessary to participate in the karaoke, and kids are welcome too.

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Loyd Have Mercy serves up home cookin' like momma's

People can't help but exclaim, "Loyd have mercy," when they eat his food.

That's why Andrew Loyd named his restaurant that.

He's not only a great cook - he's a pastor of Love Covenant Word Center in Titusville and Orlando. That's another reason why the name of his restaurant fits him so well.

Loyd has been cooking homemade favorites including soul food for over year on South Street. But now Loyd Have Mercy has just moved to a larger location just down the street in the shopping center where Wild Ocean Seafood is.

"People come from as far away as Daytona, Melbourne, Orlando and Sanford for my food," said Loyd, who grew up in Titusville and graduated from Astronaut High in 1983. "They say I've got the best wings around."

Cooking is a passion he picked up from his mother, who's from Georgia. Loyd, the second oldest of five children, did a lot of the cooking at home, even as young as 7 vears old.

"To me cooking is an art. I love to put smiles on people's faces. Then they say, 'Oh now I know why you named your restaurant Loyd Have Mercy."

The fact is, it was really his brother's idea. One day Loyd made fish and grits for his family and his brother kept saying, "Lord have mercy," while eating.

"Then he said I should have a restaurant and I should call it Loyd Have Mercy."

He and his wife, Mary - who he met decades ago while both worked at Burger King - have been overwhelmed by the community's support of his home cooking. He turned his passion into a business, but is only open Thursday through Saturday. Loyd said probably within the year, as business calls for it, he'll open for more days. He also plans to open a second location in east Orlando within the year.

Lovd and Mary have one daughter, 21-year-old Janna, who is following in her father's footsteps as a pastor, and wants to go to culinary school to be a pastry chef.

They are excited to move around the corner into the shopping center because the location offers more tables in his restaurant, a bigger parking lot and a more popular spot.

"People love to sit and eat in my restaurant and now there will be a whole lot of more room," he said.

Loyd Have Mercy does a tremendous amount of takeout. "Quite a lot of folks have big orders for their family or they have parties," he said. Because of popular demand for his wings, Loyd is planning to offer buckets of wings soon.

So what's on the menu? Plenty.

No matter if you're from the city or the farm, no matter what ethnicity, Loyd Have Mercy has delicious dishes for everyone - and at a minimal cost.

"It's very important to me to have affordable prices for everyone in this economy," he said. In addition to lowpriced items, he also offers daily specials including \$5 lunch specials available between 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. Choose from eight wings, gizzards, a meatball sub, whiting sandwich, hamburger or a turkey and/or ham sub. Lunch specials include one side item and a fountain drink.

The wide menu has sandwiches and burgers – from a BLT to a pork chop sandwich. Those who'd like something bigger can choose from a meatball, philly cheese steak, turkey and ham sub complete with one side for \$5 to \$6.

Dinners include gizzards, chitterlings with rice, meat loaf, cubed steak and rice, turkey wings with rice, fried chicken, smothered chicken, pork chops and oxtails with rice. Prices range from \$6 to \$10.

Choose from fried, hot, mild, garlic or barbecue wings. Get eight for \$5, 10 for \$6 or 12 wings for \$7.

Many love his seafood, which includes mullet, whiting, sheephead, catfish and tilapia. You can choose a sandwich, basket or dinner, ranging from \$6 to \$9. Shrimp is very popular at the restaurant. Choose 10 shrimp (we're talking big shrimp), fried or garlic, for \$9 for a sandwich. \$10 a basket or \$1 for a dinner.

Dinners include the entrée, two sides and a corn muffin. You can feed a family for a great price at Lovd Have Mercy. Get eight wings, 10 shrimp and one large side for \$15. Or get a half slab of ribs and two large sides for \$13.50. One slab of ribs and three large sides is \$23.

Other favorites are Loyd's barbecue ribs and chicken. You can get a sandwich, basket or dinner or just the ribs and chicken only.

Kids under 10 eat a great meal for just \$3 – a burger, hot dog, grilled cheese or three chicken drumettes plus fries and a small drink.

Coenzyme Q10 (CoQ10) is a vitamin-like compound found naturally in cells and is necessary for the production of energy in the body. It is also believed to be an antioxidant, which neutralize free radicals that are believed to contribute to a number of health problems.



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
