Titusville Fishing Pier

The first Titusville Bridge across the Indian River to Merritt Island was opened on December 15, 1922. This two lane wooden structure served North Brevard as a connector to Merritt Island and the beaches until World War II. Because of the death of six soldiers when they drove through the wooden guard railing on August 11, 1942, the Federal and State Government took steps to construct a new concrete bridge with a steel swing span and it was opened on February 21, 1949.



The City of Titusville obtained rights to the western portion of the old wooden bridge to use as a Fishing Pier and it was advertised as the "Longest FREE Fishing Pier in the World" up until the early 1970's. By the 70's time and hurricanes had taken their toll and a new Fishing Pier was dedicated as the "Titusville Veterans Memorial Fishing Pier" on February 27, 1977.

By the mid 1990's weather and time once again placed the pier in jeopardy and in 1994 the City of Titusville authorized a citizen's volunteer committee to solicit funds to replace the wooden decking on the pier. While local funds were being raised, the city was able to obtain a grant to replace the boards. In the late 90s it was discovered the steel

reinforcement rods inside the concrete beams supporting the concession stand were rusting from the salt air which caused structural concerns and the concession stand portion of the pier was closed.


While efforts were underway to construct a new concession and restaurant in 2005, two boats broke loose during Hurricane Wilma and destroyed the 1970s Fishing Pier. The new restaurant was opened in 2008 and a complete new pier opened in the Spring of 2010.

Titusville's First Beach House

Many years ago, Titusville had its very own beach. That is until NASA took it for their Space program. The Museum has a large aerial picture of Titusville Beach dotted with houses, along the dunes. The very first house built on the beach was built and owned by Frank and Leila (Tuddie) Clark, the parents of Dr. James (Jim) Clark of Titusville. The Clark beach house was the only house on the beach for eleven years before others built there.



In the early 1930's, Frank Clark hauled his building supplies across the river by way of Titusville's original wooden bridge. The Clark's house (cottage) consisted of a great room with a bathroom in one corner, a kitchen, and one bedroom built off to the side. It originally had no electricity, and the only water was pumped from a well. Dr. Clark remembers his father hauling a block of ice for their "ice box" and using lanterns for light. The Clark's never lived in the house fulltime. It was considered their "summer cottage" for one month a year.



In 1966, NASA bought the land from Frank and Tuddie Clark for \$26,000. After having the bedroom torn off to make the journey across the bridge, Frank had Roy Roberts move their cottage to the corner of Bayview Street and Rodger Drive.

The Clark summer cottage still remains today long after Tuddie who passed away in 1965 and Frank who passed years later in 1997. Without even noticing the cottage, some of you may have driven past it on your way to Dr. Clark's Dental Office located on the corner of Hopkins Avenue and Bayview Street. Above is the picture of Dr. Clark's family beach house located fourth from the bottom on the aerial picture of Titusville Beach, and as it stands today with Dr. Clark and Mrs. Clark standing in front of it. Dr. and Mrs. Clark will celebrate their 55th wedding anniversary on November 24th. Dr. Clark practiced Dentistry in Titusville from 1969 to 1996, and Patsy Clark was a home Economics teacher at THS.



In retrospect, so many of Titusville's original structures were either destroyed by the great conflagration of 1895 or torn down to make way for something else. We have lost cherished pieces of history and preserving the remaining historical buildings is what gives Titusville its charm.
