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As Brevard County's exclusive provider of non-emergency ambulance services, Coastal Health Systems makes important connections every day for the citizens of our community. For 30 years, our staff of trained professionals has safely transported hundreds of thousands of patients to and from various healthcare providers here in Brevard County and across our state and nation. Every day of every year, Coastal is on duty and playing a key role in Brevard's medical transportation system.

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At Coastal "Quality" is a benchmark for day-to-day performance. Coastal believes quality must be measured in many different ways, from patient surveys, on time performance measures, to clinical indicator reviews and patient care report accuracy just to name a few. Coastal's franchise agreement with Brevard County mandates very specific performance parameters including one that establishes a minimum of 90% for on time performance.

Exceeding That requirement every year, Coastal's on time performance averaged 97% over the past 10 years. Additionally, patients responding to Coastal's patient satisfaction survey have consistently rated their transports above 3.8 on a 4.0 matrix rating scale. Coastal takes performance standards very seriously and closely monitors how that performance meets the expectations of its patients, healthcare partners and county leaders.

Accreditation Matters.

Since receiving initial accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS) in 2006, it remains Coastal's goal to maintain the highest level of professional excellence. In 2015 Coastal was awarded its fourth national accreditation as one of only fifteen CAAS accredited ambulances services in Florida to achieve this distinction, considered to be the gold standard in the ambulance industry. In 2018 Coastal will undergo inspection preparing for its fifth re-accreditation award. While difficult to meet, the standards that must be met for this accreditation demonstrate Coastal's steadfast dedication to the community and its partners in quality.

Coastal Health Systems is a truly unique not-for-profit organization in partnership with Brevard's hospitals and Brevard County. Operating under the vision and guidance of a Board of Directors with members from Brevard hospitals and with the important oversight of the Board of County Commissioners, Coastal must meet the highest professional and service standards and remain capable of responding to the needs and vision of the county's health care and emergency services professional's alike. THE FOUR Rs

SAVING THE INDIAN RIVER LAGOON

In school, it is critical to implement the “Three Rs” of reading, ‘riting and ‘rithmetic.

With the Indian River Lagoon, it is paramount to use the “Four Rs,” as the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Program presses ahead by **Reducing** ongoing sources of pollution, **Removing** old pollution accumulated in muck deposits, **Restoring** natural filtration systems and **Responding** to changing conditions, information and technology.



Much work remains as the Save Our Indian River Lagoon program tackles projects proposed by the community, monitors the performance of projects and continues to educate the public. Sixty-three projects are expected to begin by September of this year, and more have been proposed. This is only the beginning and patient dedication is necessary. It took many decades to load this much pollution into the lagoon and it will take a full decade of load reduction, removal and restoration projects to undo the damage. No matter how fast projects get started, there is still a high risk of algae blooms and fish kills for several more years.

The half-cent sales tax approved in 2016 to fund the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan was intended to get things started. Thanks to economic growth in the county, the revenue generated proved to be \$42 million instead of the estimated \$34 million for 2017. The extra injection of cash brings welcomed accelerated execution of programs to restore this amazing estuary and natural treasure that is home to a rich diversity of plants and animals.

Reducing sources of pollution focuses on raising awareness of the negative impact of fertilizers and reducing the pollution from septic systems, sewer systems and stormwater. Although nutrients are essential for estuarine systems such as the Indian River Lagoon, you can have too much of a good thing and an overabundance of these nutrients turn them into pollutants.

Brevard residents love their green lawns, but they come at a high price for the lagoon. Many pounds of the fertilizers applied in excess of the amount needed to keep backyards bright green eventually end up at the lagoon, where they cause algal blooms that reduce sunlight and oxygen, resulting in seagrass die-offs and mass deaths of fish, mammals and seabirds, and in rare occasions contribute to human illness. Excess fertilizers run off the land and into the lagoon through stormwater and soak through the ground into groundwater that carries excess nutrients to the lagoon. Stormwater runoff occurs when rainfall hits. This rain water carries excess fertilizers with it as it washes into storm drains and canals. The amount of fertilizer entering the Indian River Lagoon annually is estimated at 81,700 pounds of nitrogen and 4,200 pounds of phosphorus.

Brevard's 80,000 septic systems also contribute to groundwater pollution that migrates to the lagoon. Septic systems, even when sited, designed and functioning properly, still add nutrients to the groundwater. Among the Save Our Indian River Lagoon projects implemented this past year to reduce sources of pollution was the conversion of 142 homes from septic to sewer in the Breeze Swept Community in Rockledge; the upgrade to a more efficient and effective baffle box on Central Boulevard in Cape Canaveral; the installation of denitrification barriers around the package treatment plant at Long Point Park; stormwater treatment through irrigation reuse at Gleason Park in Indian Harbour Beach; and the construction of a stormwater pond at the Bayfront community of Palm Bay.

These five projects, along with completion of Phase 1 of the septic to sewer conversion of the Merritt Island Redevelopment Agency, are already reducing 4,302 pounds of nitrogen that would otherwise negatively impact the lagoon annually.

Removing old pollution accumulated in muck deposits is another essential component of the plan. Muck is not the natural bottom of the lagoon, but this organic-rich sediment has invaded the estuary thanks to sources such as grass clippings, sod, dying algae and seagrass, and other

debris from development. Muck now covers 10 percent of the naturally sandy bottom of the Indian River Lagoon in Brevard, inhibiting seagrass growth and depleting oxygen necessary for bottom-dwelling organisms.

In March of last year, the Turkey Creek muck dredging project completed removal of approximately 215,000 cubic yards of muck from Turkey Creek in Palm Bay as part of the initiative to improve water quality in the Indian River Lagoon. Unfortunately, Hurricane Irma deposited 14,000 cubic yards of muck onto the previously dredged area. Should the application from FEMA be successful, the cost of this work will only be a 12.5 percent share to the plan.

The Save Our Indian River Lagoon Program will spearhead dredging initiatives to remove large deposits of muck within the lagoon, but long-term success will depend on continued reduction of pollutant sources that generate muck.

Restoring natural filtration systems depends on the outstanding qualities of a rather unassuming mollusk: the oyster. These bivalves, together with plants, provide significant erosion control while restoring coastal habitats. Oysters, which are natural filter feeders, consume and remove algae and nutrients from the water, and expel clean, filtered water. Oyster colonies are reef-life structures that provide food or habitat for more than 300 different species and minimize shoreline erosion. Approximately 20 miles of oyster reef living shorelines will be constructed through the lagoon, expected to create

an oyster population that will reduce 21,120 pounds of nitrogen and 7,181 pounds of phosphorus annually.

Responding to changing conditions, information and technology entails open communications with the community. A Citizens' Oversight Committee, composed of 14 members representing a diversity of interests, ensures transparency.

Communication with researchers from institutions such as Florida Tech, University of Florida, University of Central Florida, Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute and Bethune Cookman, will contribute to the program's success, as will partnerships with organizations with citizen science programs such as Marine Resources Council's Muck Finders and Brevard Zoo's Restore Our Shores.

The Save Our Indian River Lagoon Program expands upon Brevard County's fertilizer ordinance by increasing awareness of existing rules and best management practices through public education programs, such as Blue Life, and through the funding of projects that directly reduce pollutants in the lagoon.

While an unexpected increase in sales tax revenue has allowed the Save Our Indian River Lagoon program to get a jump start, it is ultimately up to the residents of Brevard to help rescue their lagoon by volunteering with restoration efforts, adopting lagoon-friendly practices and encouraging friends and neighbors to do likewise. Community involvement is ultimately the key for rapid and sustainable improvement ■

Emergency Management BEST Program



During Hurricane Irma, over 1,700 County employees worked doing response and/or recovery to return our community back to normalcy as quickly as possible. Of that 1,700, 392 county employees became members of the Brevard Emergency Support Team (BEST). Developed through the County's Lean Six Sigma process, the BEST program was created as a way to serve 'those in need' by helping the most vulnerable safely navigate the turbulent times of emergencies. Emergency Management trained over 600 County and Brevard Public Schools (BPS) employees to serve as shelter workers and managers through the BEST Program in order to ensure all County shelters were sufficiently staffed and each facility had appropriate resources to support their operations.

As we activated the BEST Program for Irma, 131 Brevard BEST members worked alongside the Florida Department of Health and BPS at the five special needs shelters which provided a place of safety to 737 individuals with special medical needs. In our four pet-friendly shelters, 108 Brevard BEST members and volunteers from the State Animal Response Team provided safe shelter to 613 residents and their 468 pets. At our twelve general population shelters, 153 Brevard BEST members with BPS sheltered 2,753 residents. At these shelters, our BEST members also integrated volunteers from the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services team, and food was provided through the Salvation Army, Community Kitchen, and Red Cross. These teams did a wonderful job providing communications and food support to the County shelters to ensure residents and visitors were well taken care of throughout Hurricane Irma.

With the development and implementation of the BEST Program, Brevard County's

sheltering program has been recognized statewide as a best practice for a locally built, locally supported program. Hurricane Irma required activation of the BEST Program while still in "Year Zero" of development for potentially one of our worst-case scenarios. This allowed for countless lessons to be learned, which Emergency Management has been working hard to solve and update processes prior to the 2018 hurricane season. As other counties carefully examine their sheltering programs over the next year, Brevard County Emergency Management will be presenting the BEST Program at the Governor's Hurricane Conference in May in order to share best practices with emergency managers from across the nation.

- Successfully responded to Hurricane Irma, overseeing the Emergency Operations Center and all County departments and partner agencies to ensure a coordinated response.
- Implemented Special Needs Program Registry birthday postcards to reaffirm our relationship with individuals on the Special Needs Registry and update their information.
- Implemented BeOn application, extending the public safety radio capabilities to select smartphones and tablets, providing Push-To-Talk communications far beyond the boundaries of Brevard County by using cellular data signal or WiFi connectivity.



UF/IFAS BREVARD EXTENSION SERVICE MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

Keeping Kids Safe!

In 2017 UF/IFAS Extension continued the tradition of providing safety education. As a result, 233 parents/caregivers participated in child passenger safety events to learn how to keep their children safe while in motor vehicles. In addition to classroom education, there were over 100 car seats checked for proper selection, installation and use, and for those in need, 73 seats were distributed. To aide in reaching the public with Child Passenger Safety, the Extension also trains additional technicians throughout the county allowing an additional 68 seats to be checked and 29 distributed. Furthermore, nine new Child Passenger Safety Technicians were certified, further extending the outreach of the UF/IFAS Extension Child Passenger Safety Program.

My Brevard Yard Site Visits – Going Strong!

The program assists residents in the proper fertilization and irrigation practices to produce healthy landscapes and waterways. During site visits, soil and water samples are collected for testing and an irrigation zone is calibrated to determine if the correct amount of water is being applied. Residents who received a MBY site visit prior to June 2017 were sent emails to collect data on practice changes adopted because of the site visit. Responses were gathered from 56% of the participants on the new Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ practices they had adopted. The practices with the highest percentage of adoption included 55% use foliar sprays of liquid seaweed to supply trace elements, 44% now test the soil to determine their fertilization program and 33% apply accurate amounts of fertilizer per 1,000 sq. ft. In 2017, a total of 52 site visits were conducted. As of mid-February 2018, site visits are off to a strong start with 20 site visits conducted or requested.

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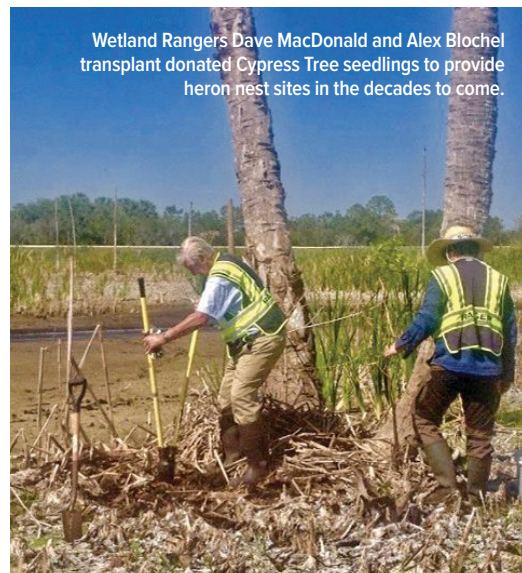

'Rangers' Play Pivotal Role For Viera Wetlands

During the 2017 calendar year, volunteer "Wetland Rangers" served 2,233 hours under the direction of the Natural Resources Management Department at the Viera Wetlands (Ritch Grissom Memorial Wetlands and adjacent storage ponds).

Through an ongoing agreement with Utility Services, Natural Resources provides land management, including volunteer coordination, for this manmade wetland system, a treatment component of South Central Water Reclamation Facility. Even though Hurricane Irma caused the site to be closed for nearly two months, over 154,000 public visitors – including tourists from around the world – passed through the wetland site's main gate during the remaining 10 months. While addressing the County's safety, security, and unique budgetary concerns, the volunteer Wetland Rangers make this ongoing public access to the site possible. This allows visitors to enjoy the site's renowned opportunities to view wildlife.

In addition to their service contributions, the Wetland Rangers raised more than \$8,200 in donations during 2017, bringing their five-year total to nearly \$35,000. These donated funds help reduce invasive exotic vegetation and repair berm damage caused by vehicular use. Wetland Rangers play a key role in making the Viera Wetlands one of Brevard's premier eco-tourism destinations.

TOURISM DEVELOPMENT OFFICE MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

- With the completion of the USSSA Space Coast stadium complex, reallocation of the tourist tax for the Space Coast was approved. Based on the 5% tourist tax with revenues received last year of \$12.7 million, 47% of funds will be used for promotion and advertising; 25% for beach improvement; 14% to capital facilities projects; 2% for Visitor Information; 4% to Cultural events; 5% to Brevard Zoo; and 3% to the stadium for maintenance. Director Eric Garvey stated the changes began with the November 2017 collections. It is estimated that collections for FY 2017-2018 will be \$14,345,996.
- Because the Space Coast led the state in key tourism metrics, Florida Gov. Rick Scott held a Press Conference at the Brevard Zoo to announce Florida's record visitation for 2016 (112.8 million tourists to Florida). The Space Coast Office of Tourism was given the opportunity to highlight its own successful 2016 with leading tourism growth metrics of Room Demand – up 7 % and tax revenues up 15%.

FIRE RESCUE MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

Chief of the Year:

Mission: Lifeline

The department was recognized by the American Heart Association (AHA) for Excellence in Cardiac Care and was awarded the AHA Mission: Lifeline Silver Plus Award.

Community Health Resource Program

Thirty-seven repeat 911 callers who did not require emergent service were enrolled in the CHRP program. Thirty of the thirty-seven callers were able to receive the assistance they required. A reduction of repeat 911 callers requesting transport to the hospital, but did not require emergency care, showed a 71% decrease from 2016-2017. A reduction of repeat callers requesting emergency services, but who did not want to be transported to the hospital, showed a 66% decrease from 2016-2017.

Training Bureau

The Training Bureau conducted over 146,106 hours of training across the entire department. That equals an average of 269.1 hours per person. Of the total training hours, 13,431.2 hours involved EMS training and 15,306 hours were facility training.

LIBRARY SERVICES MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

- In 2017, there were 339,729 e-book checkouts via our Overdrive system, a 33% increase over the previous year.
- On May 26, 2017, the Central Library was rededicated and renamed in honor of Brevard's most beloved Library Services Director, Catherine Schweinsberg Rood. Ms. Rood led the library system for 12 years, before retiring in 2012. She passed away in 2016.
- The Brevard County Historical Commission is now supported by Library Services, and maintains its archive at the Catherine Schweinsberg Rood Central Library in Cocoa. The Commission collects historical artifacts, catalogues and digitizes historical records and photographs. The Commission, in partnership with the Library, has resumed its oral history project, interviewing prominent local residents on video. These form an amazing record of earlier times in Brevard County and can be enjoyed by going to the Brevard County Historical Commission channel on YouTube.

PARKS & RECREATION MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

Parks and Recreation Assist in Manatee Relocation

Brevard County Parks & Recreation Department worked in collaboration with multiple organizations and volunteers to help relocate 10 manatees to the Indian River Lagoon that were found isolated in Cooper River, South Carolina.

The manatees were found in the Cooper River by a warm water outflow without sufficient food sources, in place of migrating south to naturally warm water. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service staff made the decision to rescue and relocate the manatees with the assistance of Sea World Orlando's manatee rescue team. The rescue operation took place over three days from November, 28-30, 2017.

Of the captured manatees, eight were males, and two were females. Nine of the manatees were released using the Brevard County Parks and Recreation Port St. John boat ramp, and one female manatee remains at the Jacksonville Zoo for rehabilitation. Five of the manatees released were tagged by the Sea to Shore Alliance in an effort to monitor them as part of their Atlantic Coast Manatee Study.

PARKS & RECREATION MIMS | NORTH AREA

Harry T. & Harriette V. Moore Memorial

Completed in June, 2017 construction included adding a walking trail around the memorial, upgrading building drainage, flooring, and technology. Project received \$275,000 in grants for enhancements.

PARKS & RECREATION MERRITT ISLAND | CENTRAL AREA

Ulumay Wildlife Sanctuary

Selected as a winner of the national "Meet Me at the Park" campaign and awarded a \$20,000 grant from the National Recreation Park Association, Walt Disney Company, including Disney Citizenship, Disney/ABC Television Group and ESPN. Renovation began in November for the viewing tower that is approximately 16 feet high. Three mini wildlife viewing platforms were also built 4-5 feet high with steps to go along with the tower to connect children of all ages with nature.

PARKS & RECREATION TITUSVILLE | NORTH AREA

24th Annual Fox Lake Christmas Craft Festival

This festival began in 1994 by combining the traditional Christmas Craft Sale at Sandrift Recreation Center with Tom Statham's homemade fall craft sale. Only handmade crafts were offered for sale at the fair, with more than 180 crafters present.

- **Event date:** Saturday, November 18, 2017
- **Estimated attendance:** 6,000

PARKS & RECREATION MELBOURNE | SOUTH AREA

Wickham Park Pavilion

Completed in December 2017, the newly constructed 12,240-square-foot pavilion has 33 paved parking spaces, 112 overflow parking spaces, restrooms, a warming kitchen, and can hold up to 750 individuals. It is now used for Brevard County Parks and Recreation activities and events, such as Movies in the Park, and is also available for rent.

- **Funding:** Paid for by referendum after the lease for the old Wickham Park Pavilion expired with Eastern Florida State College

Resurfacing costs \$110,000–\$125,000 per mile of road. Reconstruction costs over \$550,000 per mile of road.



Southern Segment of the St. Johns Heritage Parkway

Opened to traffic November 2017, this new segment is a 3.1 mile, 2-lane roadway from north of Emerson Boulevard to US 192 in West Melbourne. Major items of work included clearing and grubbing, excavation and embankment, paving, bridge construction, curb and gutter installation, sidewalk construction, signalization at US 192, signage and pavement markings. The Engineer of Record was DRMP, Inc., and the contractor was Ranger Construction Industries, Inc. The County completed the design of the Northern Segment of the St. Johns Heritage Parkway in December 2017. The Northern Segment will construct a 1 mile, 4-lane roadway from north of US 192 to just west of the proposed I-95 Ellis Interchange.

■ **Construction:** Anticipated in Fall 2018

Wickham Road and Forest Lake Intersection Improvements Project

District 4: Completed July 2018, the project consisted of signalizing this intersection by installing four new mast arm traffic signals. Road and Bridge Construction was the lead contractor and utilized County traffic signal contractors to perform work at a significant cost and time savings to the County.



Wickham Road and Stadium Parkway Intersection Project

District 4: Completed May 2017, this project consisted of constructing additional roadway lanes, turn lane improvements and the installation of mast arm signals and associated pedestrian crossing facilities. Project constructed by Jr. Davis Construction Company, Inc.

Wendy Lee Drive Sidewalk

District 1: Road and Bridge Construction installed a concrete sidewalk along Wendy Lee Drive near Imperial Estates Elementary School to Little League Way at Sisson Road in Titusville. Completed in August, 2017, the new 1650 LF of sidewalk now provides a safer pedestrian corridor for the community.

Road Resurfacing Plan

In April 2017, the Board of County Commissioners unanimously approved allocating funds to increase the number of miles resurfaced to 55 miles for the next four fiscal years beginning FY 2017/2018, increasing to 61 miles in 2022. The five-year plan will accomplish the resurfacing of 284 miles of “at risk” County-maintained roads.

Space Coast Area Transit's 2017 goal was to 'Make It Better'. Initiatives were created to increase transparency and receive valuable input from customers and stakeholders.

Ride with Jim

An open house on wheels was created through a partnership with Bagel 13. Ride with Jim provided the general public an opportunity to chat over coffee and a bagel to suggest transit improvements, ask questions, and offer ideas for the future. Transit Talk

A monthly series of Facebook live events offered stakeholders an unscripted, behind-the-scenes look at the different facets of transit. Segments on how to purchase bus passes online, updates of maps and schedules, and a promotion called Mobility Week were included as part of the series. The social media handle is @321Transit.

Launched New Website

A new state-of-the-art website, 321Transit.com was unveiled. An improved trip planning feature allows users to save and label trips for future reference. By selecting a route from the interactive map, customers can choose a travel day, view all the bus stops on the route, select one, view the stop times and print out a pocket guide.

MOSQUITO CONTROL MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

Marsh Restorations

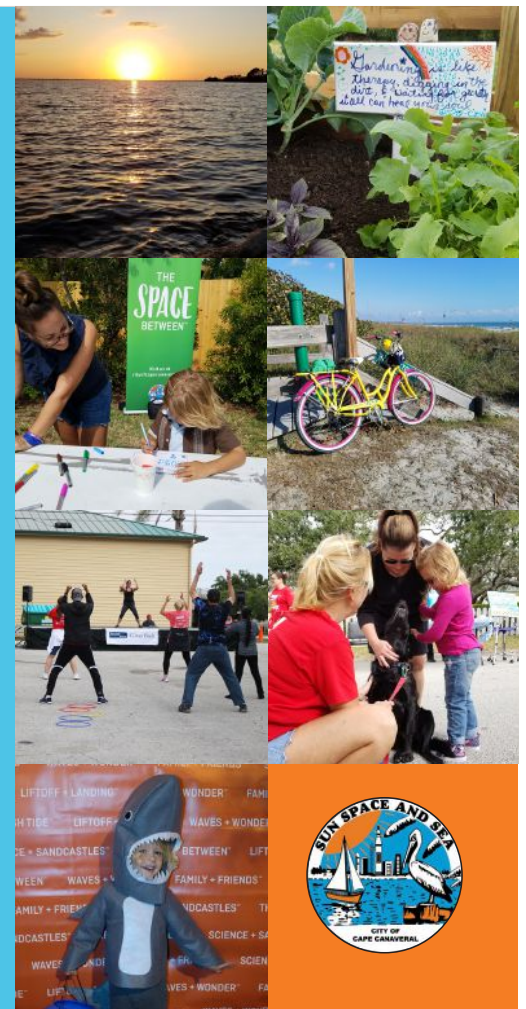
- A pilot project, in cooperation with St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWD) and Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge explored the possibility of restoring subsided marshland to its original elevation.
- Restoration of a more natural hydrology in several impoundments on the South Beaches in cooperation with SJRWMD and Florida Department of Environmental Protection. The project involved strategic placement of several culverts which allowed the removal of several thousand feet of unneeded earthen barriers on the upland side of the impoundments.

In 2017, over 1.1 million acres (1,795 sq. miles) were treated for mosquitoes.



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UTILITY SERVICES REPAIRS

S-17 Lift Station Replacement

Completed replacement in Indian Harbour Beach of Lift Station S-17. Slated for replacement in the current Capital Improvement Projects plan, construction work had just been started when Hurricane Irma impacted the region. During the storm, rainfall inundated the old “can-type lift station”, shorting out the pumps and all of the electrical controls. A by-pass pumping system was initiated earlier than planned. The station is now handling the sewage flow from the customers in the area.

**Lift Station C-12 Replacement**

Lift Station C-12 in Merritt Island has been replaced with a new, submersible duplex pump station. Located at the rear of two adjacent residential properties, the work to install a new lift station wet well, new electrical control and monitoring system, and new discharge piping posed significant challenges but has been completed with minimal impact to the residents in the area. The new C-12 is now handling the wastewater flow from this neighborhood.

**Gravity Sewer Lining of Barefoot Bay Lift Station**

Efforts to reduce Infiltration and Inflow, I&I, were initiated in the Barefoot Bay Sewer District with work starting in the Lift Station X-1 collection system. After installing a resin-impregnated liner through the old and cracked clay gravity sewer lines, the contractor then introduced steam under low pressure to reform the liner and cure it in place. After curing, the openings to each property were re-established with robot cutting equipment. The result is a ‘pipe-within-a-pipe’ liner that seals all of the cracks and defects and prevents infiltration of ground water and storm water.

Barnes Blvd. Widening Project

District 4: Project consisted of widening the existing two-lane Barnes Boulevard to four lanes with a center median. Length is approximately one mile and also includes two large retention areas. Work included clearing and grubbing, earthwork, waterline, sewer line and reuse line relocations, drainage pipe installation, sidewalk, and mast arm traffic signalization. Engineer of Record is Bussen-Mayer Engineering Group, Inc., and contractor is Jr. Davis Construction Company, Inc.

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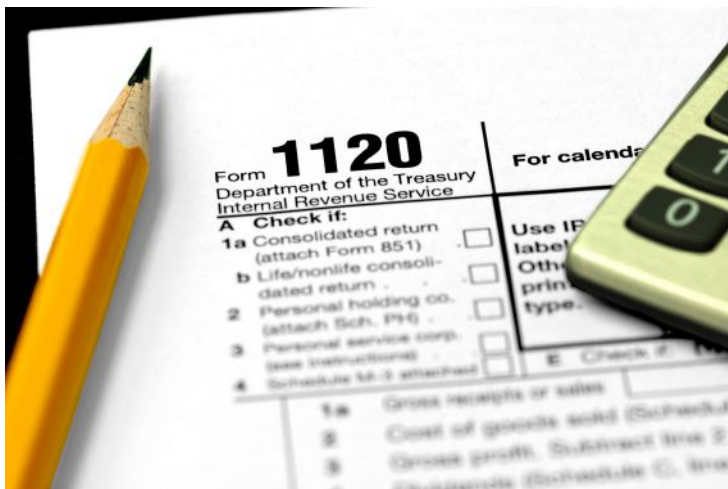

Cape Canaveral’s Economic Development Director, Todd Morley, kicked off the interactive event by sharing the city’s progressive model of sustainability. “Bikes” speaker Aviva Manin, Account Director for the Bike Share vendor Zagster, stated that Phase 1 of the Space Coast program included 80 bikes at 10 stations throughout Cape Canaveral and Cocoa Beach. Manin said the bikes

The highlight of the jam-packed B4 Summit was keynote speaker Andrew Evans, a National Geographic Travel Journalist and host of “World’s Smartest Cities”, a TV series that showcases innovation and urban sustainability all over the world. As National Geographic’s first Digital Nomad, Evans spent five years sharing his adventures online in real-time via Twitter, Instagram, Facebook, and YouTube. Evans gained a worldwide following with an epic overland journey from National Geographic headquarters in Washington, D.C., all the way to Antarctica, by bus—a 12,000-mile journey through 9 states and 14 countries, and the focus of his keynote speech. Throughout the harrowing ride, including areas of no paved roads and the threat of bandits, Evans made

numerous connections with people he met along the way. “What I learned is the world is very small,” he said. “Transit and mobility is about allowing people to have opportunity. While Antarctica may not be their destination, being able to get to work or school allows them to fulfill their own goals and dreams. Smarter sustainable cities invest in mobility options to attract high tech businesses and millennial, tech-savvy, educated employees. Cities who don’t plan for the future will be left behind,” Evans stated.

Following the B4 Summit, attendees traveled to Manatee Sanctuary Park on Space Coast Area Transit buses for a picnic luncheon and Bike Share ribbon cutting. Participants had the opportunity to be professionally fitted with a free bike helmet, test-ride a Bike Share bike, and receive a personally autographed book, The Black Penguin, authored by Evans. “It was encouraging to see the number of stakeholders investing their time in the future of transit and tourism in Brevard County,” stated Jim Liesenfelt. “It’s just one more tool in the box that helps promote transparency in government.”

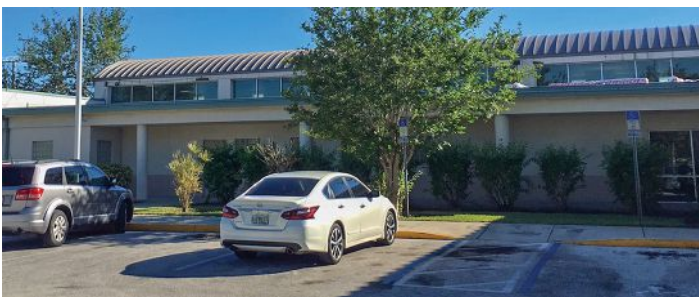


South Landfill Cell One Begins Operation

The Solid Waste Management Department has officially kicked off operations in South Landfill Cell One, located at the Central Disposal Facility (CDF) in Cocoa. The first load of waste was deposited into Cell One on January 16. This marks the culmination of years of planning and construction in order to continue to serve the citizens of Brevard at the CDF after the existing 192-acre Slurry Wall landfill, operated by the County since 1972, reaches its capacity limit.

South Landfill Cell One is a 42-acre, double-lined landfill cell that serves as the first phase of the 195-acre South Landfill expansion. Cell One took 16 months to construct, at a permitting, construction, oversight, and materials testing cost of \$19.5 million. The South Landfill expansion is designed to meet strict environmental protection regulations and provide cost-effective solid waste disposal for the citizens of Brevard until at least 2060.

■ During the Florida Emergency Preparedness Association Annual Work Session in February, Brevard County Emergency Management was recognized for continued leadership within the statewide Association. Emergency Planning Coordinator Kate McMillan earned her Florida Professional Emergency Manager designation and was selected to co-chair the Technology Committee. Emergency Operations Coordinator John Scott was elected Vice President of the Association, recognized as past co-chair of the Technology Committee, and selected as co-chair for the Training and Professional Development Committee. Senior Emergency Management Coordinator Michele Jones was recognized as past co-chair of the Higher Education Committee, continues to serve as Area Governor, and was selected to co-develop the Association's mentorship program.

■ Brevard County Emergency Management coordinated a county-wide Public Information Network exercise which was evaluated by FEMA to ensure the County could provide a coordinated, timely, and accurate message to the public. FEMA has determined that all areas of compliance were met, and the County has come through with flying colors. Wonderful job to all participating agencies and public information officers, and thank you to Brevard County Communications Department for its leadership of the Public Information Network.



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NATURAL RESOURCES SHORE PROTECTION

Federal Emergency Project Brings Sand to Brevard's Beaches



The Federal Brevard County Shore Protection Project is implemented by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) with Brevard County as the local sponsor. The project is divided into two separate “reaches,” the North Reach, which stretches 9.4 miles and includes the Cities of Cape Canaveral and Cocoa Beach, and the South Reach, which stretches 3.8 miles and includes the Towns of Indialantic and Melbourne Beach. Since the initial restoration in the early 2000’s, the project has exceeded performance expectations, providing protection for structures and infrastructure along the shoreline. This project has kept the ocean at bay during multiple storms including three hurricanes in 2004, Hurricane Sandy in 2012, Hurricane Matthew in 2016, and Hurricane Irma in 2017. A federally funded Flood Control & Coastal Emergency Act (Public Law 84-99) recovery project is currently being implemented by the Corps to restore the integrity of the Brevard County Shore Protection Project.

An emergency contract was awarded to Great Lakes Dredge & Dock by the Corps in November 2017 to replace sand eroded from the federal project areas by 2 hurricanes – Matthew and Irma. The project

will address the areas that experienced the most severe erosion: 7 miles in the North Reach and approximately 3 miles in the South Reach. An estimated 1 million cubic yards of sand will be placed on these beaches at the cost of approximately \$18.4 million – 100 percent federal dollars. During the first week of February, sand began pumping through a pipeline onto the beach in Cape Canaveral. In order to complete the beach restoration as rapidly as possible, Great Lakes has brought in three dredges to pump sand through two pipelines, twenty-four hours a day in the North Reach. Sand placement operations will shift to the South Reach once the North Reach has been completed. All beach work will be completed prior to May 1st.

These beach restoration projects place beach quality sand and native dune vegetation along the Atlantic shoreline to protect upland property and maintain healthy beaches to be enjoyed by residents, tourists and wildlife, including thousands of sea turtles that nest along these shorelines each year. Thanks to the success of these projects, the beachside economy is thriving and thousands of visitors are arriving daily to enjoy our beaches.

Construction Underway on Phase II of Brevard Zoo Trail

Construction of the second-phase extension of the Brevard Zoo Linear Park is underway adjacent to Brevard Zoo. Phase II will extend the 11-mile boardwalk and paved trail an additional 1.93 miles to Turtle Mound Road for walking, running and bicycling.

In 2000, a Parks and Recreation referendum for recreational improvements was approved by voters in South Brevard. One of those projects was the construction and design of the Brevard Zoo Linear Park.

Phase II is expected to be completed by the winter of 2019.

UTILITY SERVICES SMOKE TESTING

Beachside Sewer Lines Tested for Leaks and Cracks

Brevard County Utility Services, in partnership with the City of Satellite Beach, contracted with Kimley-Horn of Orlando to conduct smoke testing in March and April. Smoke testing is performed within the areas of the sanitary sewer system that have seen higher flows during storm and extreme weather events. These increased flows in the system may cause Brevard County Utilities to discharge insufficiently treated wastewater into the Indian River Lagoon during storm events. Smoke testing will help identify necessary repairs to maintain proper operation which ultimately protects the lagoon.

A smoke test is a standard procedure that will benefit the property owner by keeping the sewer system in working order. Smoke will be blown into a manhole and smoke will be visible exiting from the vent stacks on houses or holes in the ground. This smoke is non-toxic, non-staining, odorless, white and/or grey in color and creates no fire hazard.

South Central Regional WWTTF Expansion

Work continues on the expansion of the South Central Regional Wastewater Treatment Facility, with most of the concrete structures started. Equipping the treatment structures is the next task on the critical path. The work plan also requires completion of the new Maintenance Building early, so the existing maintenance areas can be renovated to meet the design changes.

■ **Completion Date:** January 2019



South Patrick Drive Force Main Replacement – Phase II

The Phase II work to replace the sewer force main on South Patrick Drive between Banana River Drive and Desoto Parkway in Indian Harbour Beach continues, with all of the 24" ductile iron pipe (DIP) now installed including the aerial crossing of the south drainage canal. The installation of the 20" DIP force main continues, with the work completed to a point north of Tradewinds Drive. Delayed manufacture and delivery of the specialized force main pipe has impacted the project.

■ **Completion Date:** April 2018



North Courtenay Parkway Utilities Extension

Work continues to install a new force main in Merritt Island extending on the west side from Hall Road to a point just north of Church Road. Work on the force main, and a companion reclaimed water line was hindered by the impacts of Hurricane Irma last fall. However, the work continues, reaching a milestone with the successful crossing of Porcher Road in February 2018.

The Engineer of Record is Bussen-Mayer Engineering Group, Inc., and the contractor is Gregori Construction, Inc.

Dairy Road Sidewalk

The sidewalk also connects to the recently constructed Florida East Central Regional Rail Trail constructed by FDOT. Engineer of Record is DRMP, Inc., and contractor is Estep Construction, Inc.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PRESCRIBED FIRES

Where There's Smoke... It's Likely a Prescribed Fire



Smoke on the horizon is not an unusual sight in Brevard County this time of year, and there is a reason behind it: Prescribed fires – fires intentionally set to accomplish varied land management goals -- are more prevalent during winter months because weather patterns and wind direction are more predictable and constant.

A prescribed fire is the application of fire under selected weather and fuel conditions to achieve specific goals, which include fuel reduction, maintenance of biodiversity, forest disease control, and the enhancement of habitat for threatened and endangered species. These fires must be performed with the safety of both the prescribed burner and the public in mind. All fire permits require that wind direction and a smoke management plan be included.

In 1999, the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners passed a resolution recognizing the importance of prescribed fire to accomplish varied land management goals within the County. Each fire site is typically burned in sections at different times so there are always some unburned areas for wildlife to utilize while the burned section recovers. This is why it may appear that one site is burned every year, when what is really happening is each section is burned every 3-10 years depending on the habitat type, but there may be a burn every year or every other year because a different section is being burned each time.

Prescribed fires can help reduce the intensity of wildfires, such as those sparked by lightning strikes. Heavy fuel build up resulting from dense underbrush and overgrowth of exotic plants helps intensify the spread of wildfires.

A primary goal of Brevard County's Environmentally Endangered Lands (EEL) Program is to maintain the rich biological diversity within Brevard County for future generations. Fire is one of the tools that EEL land managers use to maintain the rich variety of plants and animals.

Mims/Scottsmoor Public Library

Project consists of replacing existing library building, built from 24 modular trailers that date from 1988. The existing building had exceeded its designed lifespan and was rapidly deteriorating. Rotting floors were making parts of the building “off limits” and would become uninhabitable within a few years. The modular building will be demolished and a permanent building built on the same site.

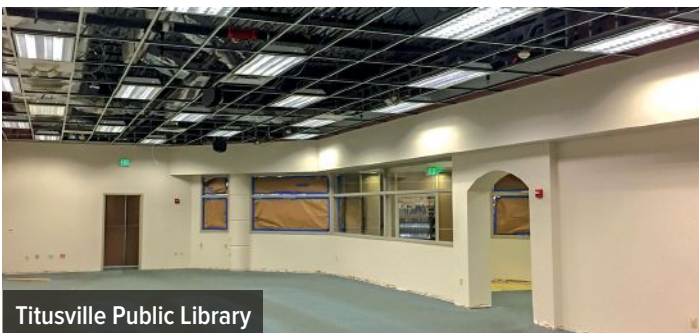
Project design was completed in the spring of 2017 and Canaveral Construction was named to oversee project. The library closed late December, materials/books stored, and the library demolished. The concrete pad of the new library was poured the week of February 12-16.

Work began summer 2017, being done in phases to allow the library to remain open to the public
